Swiss binding leaves the inner spine of the book visible. The pages are glued only to the back cover, not the front. This is not a manufacturing defect! It allows the spine of the book to lay flat while reading.

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offset or uncoated paper has a very rough finish. Unlike coated paper, with its glossy appearance and ability to have a textured coating applied on it, this material is porous and absorbs ink.

This paper has a gram weight of **170 gr.** This relates to the weight of the paper in grams per square meter. The lower the weight, the finer and more flexible the paper.
